Alaska's Salmon Enhancement Program

NDOLAN

Commercial fishermen, with cooperation from the state of Alaska, voted to take an active part in their own economic recovery by enhancing the salmon resource through ocean ranching aquaculture.

Neets Bay Hatchery

SSRAA's largest production hatchery remotely located at Neets Bay 28 miles north of Ketchikan SSRAA operates 4 hatcheries and 4 remote release sites

SSRAA enhances the state's salmon resource to provide a larger commercial harvest and create greater economic stability for the salmon fishing industry and southeast Alaska communities.

Overall, the seafood industry provides more jobs in Alaska than the oil/gas, mining, timber and tourism industries combined.

Social and Economic Impact

- In an average year SSRAA adds 27,000 salmon annually to the charter and sport fish harvest
- In 2007 alone SSRAA was responsible for producing over 46.4 million dollars of economic activity in the SSE regional economy.
- In recent years, SSRAA produced fish have averaged 15% of the volume and over 25% of the value of commercial salmon harvests in SSE.

Ketchikan's Status as a Fishing Port

- 17th largest in the U.S. by volume and value for seafood landings in 2011.
- 538 residents fish commercially
- 291 Ketchikan residents own 498 commercial fishing permits
- 375 AK registered commercial fishing vessels are home ported here.

2012 SE Salmon Season

Southeast Alaska harvested more salmon and had the highest value of any region in the state in 2012.

The SE catch was valued at \$153 million. Of that amount **\$66 million** were enhanced fish and of that total *SSRAA produced \$35 million*.

Where permit values are falling in many other parts of the state, southeast Alaska permit prices are stable or up –

- Hand troll \$11,000 1037 permits
- Power troll \$35,000 962 permits
- Drift permits \$110,000 473 permits
- Seine permits \$250,000 380 permits

Each one of these small, independent, and family owned commercial fishing vessels is a separate business that represents investment, employment and revenue to southeast communities
